Dear Friends,

In 2022, we celebrated AFSSA's 30th year serving Asian and immigrant communities. A generation has grown up with AFSSA, and we have grown with them. Our founders called their organization to help Asian survivors of violence SAHELI – a Hindi word meaning female friend – as that is what the community needed. These women created a legacy of meaningful work that has developed into a trusted resource for Central Texas survivors of violence. They asked the question, what would happen if Asian women were centered in conversations of rights and liberation? In doing so, they raised the bar for and took the first steps towards ending violence for Asian and immigrant people in Central Texas.

Today, we honor their legacy by continuing to raise that bar. AFSSA now serves a 10 county area, and we strive to uplift the voices of those who are still marginalized. From the beginning, our purpose has remained the same – to break the cycle of violence in Asian communities. Why? Because we believe in a world where everyone is free to create the life they dream, free from abuse and the fear of psychological and physical harm. We believe in a world where power and control are shared and negotiated, where we are truly free to have our bodies, hearts, and minds safe and autonomous.

When we look back on 30 years of our three core actions - Educate, Advocate, Empower - I am truly grateful for all the support and hope you have given. 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Honored our Past and Looked to the Future at the Silk Road Gala




AFSSA's direct services team proudly serves clients pursing an array of needs. Whether a client is seeking emotional support during a crisis or requesting referrals to attorneys to represent them in a divorce, our client advocates are fiercely advocating for their clients in the community. AFSSA is survivor-led and survivor-centered. Our staff speak 15 different languages and many come from our local Asian community. For survivors of violence, AFSSA is a place that can be trusted to understand their lives and their situations.

We strive to create an inclusive environment for our clients at AFSSA, and we are constantly evaluating what the community needs from our team to ensure they can live a life free of violence. With the aim of support and tools that lead to a survivor's liberation, autonomy, and financial sustainability, AFSSA's direct services include: legal advocacy and legal service accompaniment; 24/7 hotline with interpretation services; hospital accompaniment; individual and group counseling; supportive transitional housing; basic needs assistance; and economic empowerment services. **AFSSA distinguishes itself from other domestic violence providers by offering culturally relevant long-term case management in the client's preferred language and where a client's heritage and customs are normalized.**



Ming's Story

Ming became a client of Asian Family Support Services of Austin in February of 2022. Ming came from China to Austin with her former husband and son. She experienced emotional, financial, and physical abuse from her husband for several years. She depended on her husband for everything. If Ming did not listen to every command from him, he would verbally harass and belittle her until his requests were fulfilled. One day, Ming's former husband physically abused her which led to Ming fleeing the relationship. While Ming was able to leave the relationship, she still has safety concerns because her husband currently lives in the same city as her.

I first spoke to Ming in May of 2022. When I met Ming, she was very reserved and quiet. I had reached out to assist her with long term goals, specifically job assistance. She had beautiful dreams for her life and for her son's life but was not too sure where to start. We began with creating resumes and cover letters and went on to apply for a few jobs. Ming was able to quickly obtain a job at her son's school which allowed her to receive income to assist with daily needs.

As time went on, Ming began to feel more comfortable around me. She would call or text just to check in and update me on all the positive things happening in her life. Ming would even call just to see how I was doing. Her kindness and joy were never taken for granted. No matter the crisis she was in, she always was thankful to have AFSSA in her life. Ming joined a peer support group at AFFSA which allowed her to process her past and make connections with other survivors in our organization. Soon after finding a job at her son's school, she was able to find a more permanent and fulfilling job at a Montessori school. Ming is also currently working on mediation with her primary advocate and attorney to finalize her divorce and child custody.

While Ming still has big goals that she wants to fulfill, her journey has been beautiful to watch. One of the first goals Ming mentioned to me was being able to create her own art business. Now that Ming has gained security, she has been able to find time to create an online digital art website that she is beginning to make a profit on. In the short time that I have been able to work with Ming, I have been lucky enough to see her confidence and self-sufficiency flourish. AFSSA hopes to one day have Ming in transitional housing which would help her to gain even more financial security and would allow her to focus on her dreams as an artist.




Education

AFSSA's Community Education, Prevention and Outreach team breaks cycles of violence through in-person and digital outreach; bilingual prevention programming in schools; and culturally grounded trainings and presentations to community groups, school administrators, congregational leadership and members, law enforcement officers, and health care providers.

Our programming is available in home language and is always designed with an eye to meeting the various cultural needs and the myriad of barriers that impact Asian and immigrant clients and communities. Our prevention and community education advocates work in both in-person and digital spaces to not only connect survivors to essential life-saving services, but also to engage in conversations around healthy relationships and help communities and families build shared vocabulary around interpersonal violence. Our goal is to prevent violence and harm from occurring in the first place.

You can find the AFSSA outreach staff at community and cultural events all year round.







Asian Family Support Services of Austin, Awaaz San Antonio, Daya Houston, Mosaic Family Services and Texas Muslim Women's Foundation are joining together to improve outcomes and conditions for Texas's Asian and Muslim survivors of abuse. The organizations met together for the first time in 2019 in Austin, and recently reconvened several weeks ago to share best practices and discuss how we can combine efforts to end violence in our communities. With the upcoming legislative session in 2023, the organizations will work together to stay informed on bills filed and progress made. We look forward to a year full of collaboration with each other, Texas Council on Family Violence, and Texas Association Against Sexual Assault!

In 2022, AFSSA welcomed Clarice Cross as a Hogg Foundation Policy Fellow. Started in 2010, the <u>Hogg Foundation Policy Academy and Fellows program</u> awards ten organizations a two-year grant to employ a mental health Policy Fellow (a recent graduate of law, social work, public policy, public health or related field) or a Peer Policy Fellow (an individual with lived experience of mental health and/or substance use conditions). Clarice and the Public Policy Fellow position have been instrumental in building our Statewide Coalition.






